# Blood Lead Screening in Children: Provider Update 2023

This is an advisory notification to Molina Healthcare of California (MHC) network providers on blood lead screening in children.

The California Department of Healthcare Services (DHCS) and federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) require that all Medi-Cal children be tested for lead poisoning at ages 12 months and 24 months as part of required prevention services offered through the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment (EPSDT) Program.

If any child has not been tested at the above ages, and is under 72 months, they must be screened for lead poisoning as soon as they are identified.

### What you need to know:

- **All** positive blood lead levels (BLL) need to be reported to the California Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Branch (CLPPB).
  - If you are using a point-of-care testing device, you are considered a laboratory, and must report your results via the Electronic Blood Lead Reporting System: Report Results: <a href="https://www.cdph.ca.gov/programs/ccdphp/deodc/clppb/pages/report\_results.aspx">https://www.cdph.ca.gov/programs/ccdphp/deodc/clppb/pages/report\_results.aspx</a>.
- No BLL is considered safe. Therefore, if any child tests positive, you should repeat the test, even if it is low (<3.5 mcg/dl), to ensure it is not increasing, and then follow every 1 to 3 months to ensure it goes to zero.</li>
- Any child with a level of 3.5 mcg/dl or above needs intervention. This can include:
  - Nutritional counseling to ensure the child is not anemic
  - Further work-up if the child is symptomatic (e.g., abdominal xrays if the child has pica and is complaining of abdominal pain, etc.)
  - Referral to the local public health department home evaluation is usually done if the child's level is 4-5 mcg/dl or higher
  - Referral to the local California Children's Services (CCS) agency
     this is for any child with a level of 20 mcg/dl or higher

### Molina Interventions

- Any child with a BLL of 3.5 mcg/dl or above has a case manager assigned for outreach.
  - The case manager will also outreach to you, the child's PCP, to find out what follow-up has been done e.g., repeat BLLs, referrals and so forth.

- For any child with a BLL under 3.5 mcg/dl, an informational letter will be sent to the parent and the PCP.
  - o This is to ensure that every child with a positive BLL gets education about the result.
  - We want to make sure these children work with you so that together you can try to identify where the child has had lead exposure and help eliminate it from the child's environment.
